Every day 29 people are diagnosed with a brain tumour and every year over 5,000 people lose their lives to a brain tumour. Some of our staff and their families have been touched by this and we wanted to do something practical and positive to help."

The fundraising efforts will be boosted by a quiz night on 30 June when colleagues can pay £10 to take part.

This is one of the many fund raising events that staff at the national energy network firm organise to support charitable causes. From April 2019, Electricity System Operator (ESO) is a new standalone business within National Grid, legally separate from all other parts of the National Grid Group. This will provide the right environment to deliver a balanced and impartial ESO that can realise real benefits for consumers as we transition to a more decentralised, decarbonised electricity system.
- · Other UK activities mainly relate to businesses operating in competitive markets outside of our core regulated businesses; including interconnectors, gas metering activities and a liquefied natural gas (LNG) importation terminal - all of which are now part of National Grid Ventures. National Grid Property is responsible for the management, clean-up and disposal of surplus sites in the UK. Most of these are former gas works.
