From head shaving to sheep racing, climbing a training pylon and zip lining – employees from National Grid have pushed themselves to the limit to help fund energy bills for thousands of cancer patients.

The final figure has smashed the original target and the company generously matched every penny raised by employees in 2015.

Some £89,000 of the total was raised by the company's big coffee mornings where employees across the UK baked and ate thousands of cakes.

Staff members have also taken part in a total of 40 fitness challenges, including the BUPA 10km run, Wolf Run and the Yorkshire Three Peaks Challenge bringing in almost a quarter of a million pounds.

National Grid's Director of Gas Distribution Chris Train has led the Macmillan partnership. He said: "I am incredibly proud of our employees. No-one should face cancer alone and through this magnificent achievement our employees have shown that we are a company that cares.

"Thanks to their tireless fundraising efforts, people living with cancer and their families will receive the vital support they need. All the money raised will be used for Macmillan's emergency fuel grants, which mean those living with cancer can keep warm without worrying about heating bills."

Describing the partnership with National Grid as one of Macmillan's 'shining stars', Macmillan's Head of Corporate Partnerships Alix Wooding said: "We would like to thank National Grid and all its employees for their enduring support and for helping us make sure no-one has to face cancer alone.

"When families are at breaking point and have nowhere else to turn, we help. Being warm, is a fundamental part of the recovery process and the impact of our work funding heating grants is immediate, profound and long lasting."

Among the fundraisers going the extra mile is Iwan Hughes who works in the company's London office in The Strand.

Last week he set off on record breaking attempt to row 4,700 km across the Atlantic with his seven crew mates. They are hoping to complete the journey in less than 32 days.

The 35-year-old became a dad shortly before taking on the challenge which has already raised over £35,000 for Macmillan.

He said: "It is important for me to raise as much money as possible. Being tired and hungry on a boat is really nothing compared to all those incredible people and their families who are fighting cancer on a daily basis."

National Grid is pivotal to the energy systems in the UK and the north eastern United States. We aim to serve customers well and efficiently, supporting the communities in which we operate and making possible the energy systems of the future.

National Grid in the UK:

- We own and operate the electricity transmission network in England and Wales, with day-to-day responsibility for balancing supply and demand. We
 also operate, but do not own, the Scottish networks. Our networks comprise approximately 7,200 kilometres (4,474 miles) of overhead line, 1,500
 kilometres (932 miles) of underground cable and 342 substations.
- We own and operate the gas National Transmission System in Great Britain, with day-to-day responsibility for balancing supply and demand. Our network comprises approximately 7,660 kilometres (4,760 miles) of high-pressure pipe and 618 above-ground installations.
- As Great Britain's System Operator (SO) we make sure gas and electricity is transported safely and efficiently from where it is produced to where it is
 consumed. From April 2019, Electricity System Operator (ESO) is a new standalone business within National Grid, legally separate from all other
 parts of the National Grid Group. This will provide the right environment to deliver a balanced and impartial ESO that can realise real benefits for
 consumers as we transition to a more decentralised, decarbonised electricity system.
- Other UK activities mainly relate to businesses operating in competitive markets outside of our core regulated businesses; including interconnectors,
 gas metering activities and a liquefied natural gas (LNG) importation terminal all of which are now part of National Grid Ventures. National Grid
 Property is responsible for the management, clean-up and disposal of surplus sites in the UK. Most of these are former gas works.
