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1 Historic Environment Gazetteers

1.1 Designated heritage assets

1.1.1 **Table 1.1** presents all identified heritage assets located within the study area. The assets are arranged in ascending National Heritage List for England (NHLE) ID number (a single potential Military Aircraft Crash Site is included with its relevant Historic Environment Record (HER) ID number. This asset is not part of the NHLE).

1.1.2 The first column gives the Section (**Figure 2.1 Zoning Plan**) of the Proposed Onshore Scheme in which the asset is located. There are the following 13 Sections: OHL (Overhead Lines Section), CS (proposed Converter Station Site), A1 and A2 (proposed Underground High Voltage Alternating Current (HVAC) Cable Corridor), and B1, B2, B3, B4, C1, C2, C3, C4, D/Landfall (proposed Underground High Voltage Direct Current (HVDC) Cable Corridor and the proposed Landfall Site). The second column states whether the asset is located within the Draft Order Limits (DOL) or the study area (up to 1km).

1.2 Non-designated heritage assets

1.2.1 **Table 1.2** presents all non-designated heritage assets identified within the study area. The assets are arranged in ascending HER ID number (using the HER PrefRef number), followed by an asset with a UID number. The first column gives the Section (shown on **Figure 2.1 Zoning Plan**) of the Proposed Onshore Scheme in which the asset is located. There are the following 13 Sections: OHL (Overhead Lines Section), CS (proposed Converter Station Site), A1 and A2 (proposed Underground HVAC Cable Corridor), and B1, B2, B3, B4, C1, C2, C3, C4, D/Landfall (proposed Underground HVDC Cable Corridor and the proposed Landfall Site). The second column states whether the asset is located within the Draft Order Limits or the 500m study area.

1.3 Findspots and artefact scatters

1.3.1 **Table 1.3** presents all identified findspots and artefacts scatters located within the study area. The assets are arranged in ascending HER ID number (using the HER PrefRef number). The first column gives the Section (shown on **Figure 2.1 Zoning Plan**) of the Proposed Onshore Scheme in which the asset is located. 2.2 Significance and importance of non-designated heritage assets, and setting contribution

2.2.1

The first column gives the Section (shown in **Figure 2.1 Zoning Plan**) of the Proposed Onshore Scheme in which the asset is located. There are the following 13 Sections: OHL (Overhead Lines Section), CS (proposed Converter Station site), A1 and A2 (proposed Underground HVAC Cable Corridor), and B1, B2, B3, B4, C1, C2, C3, C4, D/Landfall (proposed Underground HVDC Cable Corridor and the proposed Landfall Site). The second column states whether an asset is within the Draft Order Limits or study area.
